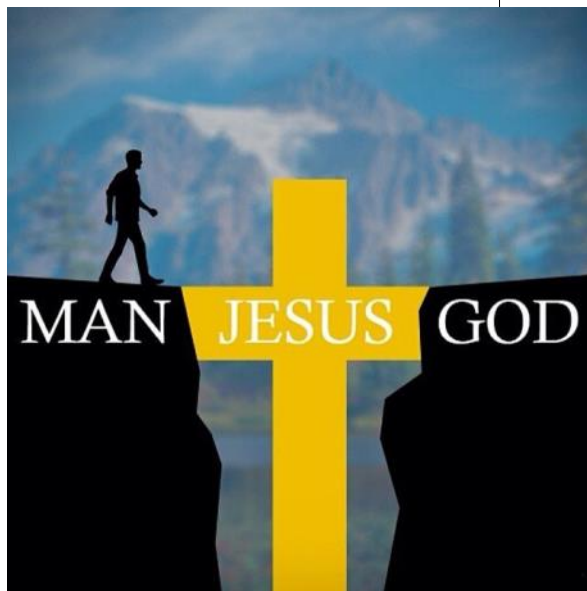
Drawing Closer to God through Lent

In our Lord's farewell discourses to His disciples as recorded in the *Gospel according to St. John 14:5*, St. Thomas asks the question, "Lord, we know not whither Thou goest; and how can we know the way?" To this, the Lord replies, "I am the way, the truth, and the life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by Me" (*St. John 14:6*, KJV). The Christian Way is a journey to God the Father through the Son in the power of and by the guidance of the Holy Spirit. It is the way of life in contrast to the way of death. The beginning of the Christian Way is marked by the sacrament of Holy Baptism. At baptism, a person turns from sin, avows belief in God the Blessed Trinity, and receives Jesus Christ as Lord (*St. John 1:12*);

in the case of the very young, these vows are taken on his behalf by his parents and godparents, and he affirms them himself during the sacrament of Confirmation. In effect, then, Christians, by receiving Christ as Lord and vowing to follow

Since this is the case, one might ask, how can Lent, being a liturgical season, and historical tradition of the Church, assist the Christian on this journey?

Lent is a season when God recalls the faithful to the heart of the Christian faith and way of life. He does this through the Church and its readings, prayers, and special services, as well as through the devout but willing exercise of spiritual discipline by the faithful as part of their whole worship. The call to prayer and fasting or abstinence is not a call to a discipline that is empty of meaning, but one that is



Him for the rest of their lives on earth, have begun their journey to God and to the fullness of His eternal kingdom. To be in union with Christ through baptism is to be already in Him Who is the way, the truth, and the life.

rich in import and value for all who undertake it, since we shall find that it exercises us in prayer and in the practice of our faith. It helps us by strengthening us also "to

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follow the blessed steps of Christ's most holy life" (Collect for the Second Sunday after Easter, p. 171, *Book of Common Prayer*, 1928).

In Lent, the faithful are given the grace-filled opportunity to reflect on the heart of their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. "Am I really following the way that is the Lord Jesus Christ?" one may ask. Someone may answer, "I am, since I believe in the Lord Jesus Christ, and that is all I need to do. I am saved by faith and grace alone." It is indeed true that we are saved by faith and grace alone (*Ephesians* 2:8-9), but it is also true that after first coming to faith and receiving God's forgiveness and free gift of righteousness, we are called to do what is right. St. John writes: "Little children, let no man deceive you: he that doeth righteousness is righteous, even as He is righteous" (*I St. John* 3:7, KJV). In accord with this the words of Article XII of The Thirty-nine Articles of Religion remind us:

Albeit that Good Works, which are the fruits of Faith, and follow after Justification, cannot put away our sins, and endure the severity of God's judgment; yet are

they pleasing and acceptable to God in Christ, and do spring out necessarily of a true and lively Faith; insomuch that by them a lively Faith may be as evidently known as a tree discerned by the fruit.

Article XII. *Of Good Works*, p. 605, *Book of Common Prayer*, 1928

The English Reformers did not dismiss good works as valueless, but through this Article underlined their importance as a sign and fruit of a living faith in the Lord Jesus Christ just as our Lord indicated in *St. Matthew* 7:17a: "Even so every good tree bringeth forth good fruit" (KJV).

Following the way of life means entering by the narrow gate of faith in Christ and walking the hard road of obedience to His call (*St. Matthew* 7:13-14). During Lent, the Church gives us the time to examine ourselves to see that we are really walking in the way of life and that we have genuinely returned to Jesus Christ, the "Shepherd and Bishop of our souls" (*I St. Peter* 2:25c).

Through the disciplines of prayer, meditation, reading and reflection on passages of the Bible, and by every other means God chooses to

speak to us, including silent contemplation of Him, we arrive at a deeper knowledge of Christ Who is the Truth, as well as a clearer perception of the truth about our own lives from His perspective. It is easy enough either to join in the discussions of people around us when they speak their mind about what is wrong with politics, national life, and the world, or to let waves of differing opinions wash over us, identifying here and there with a few that appeal to us. But it is much harder to let the Holy Spirit draw our attention to wrong opinions, thoughts, words, and actions in our own lives, attitudes and patterns of thinking that conflict with the values and norms of God's kingdom as expressed in the Bible.

Prejudice—whether it be based on race, ethnicity, or economic class—is just one example of thought or behavior that conflicts with the mandates of God's written word. How easy it is to hold fast to prejudice for decades and to refuse to hear the Holy Spirit calling us to lay aside prejudice and love all people impartially. In *Acts* 10, we see how the Holy Spirit used a vision of unclean creatures being let down in a sheet from heaven to show that God, in counting all creatures clean and none un-

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clean (that is, ritually defiling), has the same attitude to all human beings and required Jewish Christians to associate freely with Gentiles and share with them the same life-giving Gospel that they had received. This was an example of the Holy Spirit leading His Church into all truth, and the clearing away of prejudice against Gentiles led to the proclamation of the Gospel to people of all nations and races. To this day, the Holy Spirit is still working to change people's attitudes to one another for the good. Let us cooperate with the Holy Spirit in discarding all prejudice from our lives! All around us are people of different nationalities, different social classes, different ages, different

cultures. How can God use us to reach out to them with the saving Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ if we do not show them the love of Christ?

In these and many other ways, the Holy Spirit leads us into the liberating truth of God's kingdom life and its values and norms. All of Lent is an opportunity we have received from God to be led by the Holy Spirit in the way that is the Lord Jesus Christ, a way that leads to the fullness of truth that is the Lord Jesus Himself, so that instead of asking, as the Roman governor Pontius Pilate did, "What is truth?" (*St. John 18:38a*), we shall find that we are growing daily in the knowledge of Christ the truth. As we do so, we shall be growing in the life that the Lord Jesus Christ is, for as we em-

brace more fully the truth of God's word, the truth of the Lord Himself, and the Lord's truth about ourselves, we shall become more effective bearers of Christ's everlasting Gospel, "the sacred and imperishable message of eternal salvation" (*St. Mark 16:8c*, Revised English Bible).

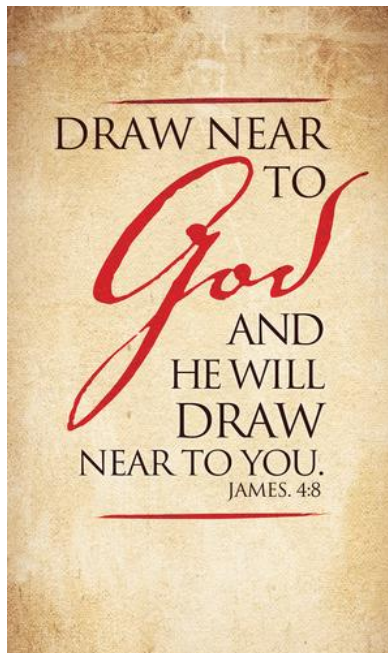

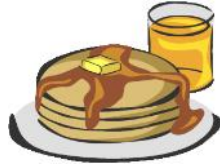
