





A Message from the Rector: The Ascension of the Lord and the Coming of the Holy Spirit

The appearances of the Lord Jesus Christ to the disciples over a forty-day period (*Acts 1:3*) following Easter Day were important to them as eyewitnesses of His resurrection from the dead. The teaching of the Lord during this period and His physical appearances to them strengthened their faith in Him and in His resurrection. But the physical presence of the Lord Jesus Christ with the apostles and other disciples did not last forever—it paved the way for His ascension into heaven and His everlasting spiritual presence with all the faithful.

St. Matthew's account of the Gospel contains no record of the Lord's ascension into heaven, but after instructing His apostles to go and make disciples of all na-

tions, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, and teaching them to observe all His commandments (*St. Matthew 28:19-20*), Jesus assures them (and really



all the faithful), "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world" (*St. Matthew 28:20b*, KJV). Another possible translation of the phrase translated here as *the end of the world* is

"the close of the age," which means the end of the present age before start of the Messianic age in which the Lord Jesus Christ rules forever. Such an assurance of the Lord's presence with His

people would not have needed to be made if Jesus had not ascended into heaven but continued to appear to the Church through the centuries. The implication at the end of *St. Matthew's Gospel* is clear: The Lord Jesus Christ will always be with His Church spiritually though He has physically ascended into heaven. The Lord's final teachings and commands to His Church on earth impressed on her the fact that each of her members were witnesses of the life, death, and resurrection of Christ and of the Gospel which they were to preach to all people.

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The Ascension of the Lord and the Coming of the Holy Spirit

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Just as there comes a time when the bicycle no longer has training wheels and one must learn to balance and ride on one's own, so for those apostles and disciples the time came when Jesus was no longer physically with them but ascended into heaven. He had told them it was necessary for Him to return to His Father's side so that they might receive the Holy Spirit. He taught them plainly in *St. John 16:7*:

St. John 16:7:

Nevertheless I tell you the truth; it is expedient for you that I go away: for if I go not away, the Comforter will not come unto you; but if I depart, I will send Him unto you.

The Comforter, or Paraclete (one who is summoned to help a person), is sent by the Lord Jesus Christ and given by the Father to every believer in Christ to strengthen him for the work and ministry of being an effective witness to the Lord Jesus Christ and to His everlasting Gospel. In the widest sense, the Holy Spirit is the Helper of every believer in Christ, their Guide (*St. John 16:13; 14:17; 15:26*) and Teacher (*St. John 14:26*).

The Church observes the Festivals of the Ascension and Pentecost (Whitsunday), not so that an ordinary, sinful life may be continued without Christ, but so that believers may bear witness to the risen, ascended Lord Jesus Christ by the help and grace of the Holy Spirit, who enables them to walk with Christ in the newness of life. The new life given by the Holy


evident in the Church ever since, but not always to the same intensity, since the Gospel has not always met with the same sincere obedience as it did in the early days of the Church.

But as we continue to bear witness to the Lord Jesus Christ and to His Gospel today, let us be found conforming our lives to this prayer of the

Bishop for a confirmand in the service of Confirmation: "Defend, O Lord, this Thy Child with Thy heavenly grace; that he may continue Thine for ever; and daily increase in Thy Holy Spirit more and more, until he come unto Thy everlasting kingdom" (page 297, *Book of Common Prayer*, 1928).

What, then, must we do to increase daily in the Holy Spirit more and more? It is certainly not by becoming busier with the affairs of this earthly life that we increase in the Holy Spirit more and more, nor by praying less, nor by reading and obeying Scripture less, nor by being more careless about the call to live a devout and holy life. On the contrary, we must practice the presence of the Lord more and more in our

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Spirit was shown in the thousands who obeyed the call of St. Peter's preaching on the Day of Pentecost and were added to the Church (*Acts 2:37-41*); it was shown repeatedly in the preaching and actions of the apostles, evangelists, and deacons in various different ways (as recorded in *Acts* and in the New Testament epistles); and such life has been

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lives. We all need to love God and our neighbor all the more day by day. We need to rejoice in the Lord daily, as *Philippians 4:4* and *I Thessalonians 5:16* teach us, and our prayer life needs to be expanded and strengthened. Here is one of the most inspiring passages in connecting rejoicing in God with being filled with the Holy Spirit:

And be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess; but be filled with the Spirit; speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord; giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Ephesians 5:18-20, KJV

The present imperative middle or passive verb *be filled* implies a continuous process of being filled with the Spirit as believers rejoice in God through psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs, which need not always be sung aloud but may be sung in our hearts to the Lord as we give thanks to God for all things. Rejoicing in the Lord is a daily activity in

not recognize until He broke bread with them in their home, transformed their understanding of the Holy Scripture of the Old Testament that they knew, so that they understood what passages prophesied His passion, death, and resurrection. If we are to increase daily in the Holy Spirit, we must expect Him to transform our understanding of the Bible and



Father in heaven, I pray to rejoice in you. Blessed be your name. Fill my heart with joy so it overflows from my words and actions. Cast out any guilt that is built up inside me. Humble me with the blessings you give us. My heart will sing how great you are. In Jesus' name I pray, amen.

which we must engage intentionally. In this way the Holy Spirit, who inspires our prayers and praises, will fill us.

Walking with the Holy Spirit is walking with God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. The two disciples on the way to Emmaus (*St. Luke 24:13-35*) found that the risen Lord Jesus Christ, whom they did

of all those passages which teach us about God and how He wants us to treat the poor, the orphans, the widows, the aliens, and all who are in need, including people of different cultures and nationalities. If we are to be effective witnesses

of Christ and His Gospel, we must be able to reach out to all people with the love of the Lord.

Security Upgrade, Budgetary Savings

Those of you who attended the Annual Meeting back in February will recall that there was some discussion as to the cost of our phone + data service line from AT&T on the budget. The increase in cost was due to the increased use of bandwidth from our new security camera system from Google/Nest. I had mentioned at the time that there was an opportunity for significant reductions in cost by switching out our camera system. I

wanted to provide everyone with an update on that process, as I have some excellent news!

First, after researching available options, I found a \$900 camera system that retains most of the capabilities of the Nest cameras:

- ..# motion detection with alerts to a smartphone of unexpected motion;
- ..# infrared and color night vision;
- ..# 4-kilobyte video so that one can actually read cars' license plates as they approach the

Chapel; and

- ..# the ability to remotely view any camera's feed from a smartphone

while adding a few additional capabilities, most notably optical Zoom on two of four cameras and local recording of video. These recordings will be on a digital loop (unless marked for saving), so newer video recordings will overwrite older ones; however, the system has enough storage to retain several weeks' worth of recordings. The local recording means that we use data bandwidth *only* when the cameras are being accessed remotely, which is what allows for significant savings on our monthly bills from AT&T.

Second, as I await the arrival of the new camera system, I have contacted AT&T to explore options for the Chapel's phone + data plan. The plan we had (which cost \$419 per month including taxes and fees) allowed for 60 gigabytes of data use. If we used more than 60 gigabytes, more data could still be used at no additional cost to us, but bandwidth (speed of transmission) was throttled. This plan was expensive and could be slow. AT&T has introduced a new plan: for \$100 the Chapel can use 100 gigabytes of data after which each additional gigabyte used costs an additional \$25. Don't worry—even at the highest-quality

setting for the Nest cameras we never used more than 80 gigabytes of data, so 100 gigabytes give us a comfortable safety margin. Once we switch to the new camera system and therefore use far less data, we can consider switching to a \$50 per month plan that limits data use to 10 gigabytes with each additional gigabyte costing \$10. In short, we have *immediate* savings of approximately \$300 every month (the \$100 figure is approximate as it does not include taxes and fees) and a further opportunity to save an additional \$50 per month (again, plus fees and taxes). Our \$5,040 budget line item will drop nearly in half to approximately \$2,480 if we stay on the \$100 plan for the remainder of the year. If we get the new camera system in place and are comfortable with the data usage being under 10 gigabytes by June, we can switch to the \$50 plan, which would bring our total for the year to approximately \$2,150. Next year that would drop to about \$700 (approximating fees and taxes) on the 10-gigabyte plan.

Both San Mateo and Santa Clara Counties have asked SLM to continue its work through the crisis, but fundraising efforts have been severely impacted and food and essential items are running low.

Donors may bring groceries and distribution items to the Food Closet at 425 Hamilton Avenue in Palo Alto on the All Saints' Church campus. Use the side door which is located to the left of the trash area to avoid the line. (Our clients enter through the other door by the patio.)

If you are new to using Zoom, the first thing to do is download the free Zoom app onto your computer, tablet, or phone. It is best to do that today. It only takes a few minutes. Your device should have an internet connection, microphone, and speaker. Your device needs to have a camera if you want to see the group and be seen. Of course, smartphones and most computers already have all of that. On a Mac or PC just go to <https://Zoom.us/download> to get the app. To get the app on your phone, go to the appropriate app store and download it.

Father Parrish will e-mail a reminder with the meeting link and password a few days before we meet for Morning Prayer. He will also e-mail the bulletin for the weeks we worship via Zoom.

Then when it's time to begin Morning Prayer, click on our meeting link. If the site asks for the meeting password, type it in. Type in your name if it asks. The site may ask if you want to connect to the meeting with video or not. Please do. Then it will ask if you want to connect with computer audio; click that, and you're all set. See you Sunday!


