A Message from the Rector: The Fruit of the Holy Spirit: Peace

he spiritual virtue of peace is the subject of this article. This virtue is profoundly important in New Testament teaching. For example, St. Paul writes, "Now the Lord of peace Himself give you peace always by all means" (*II Thessalonians 3:16*). The

ans 3:16). The risen Lord Jesus Christ Himself reassures His fearful disciples in the upper room with the words, "Peace be unto you!" (*St. John* 20:19, 21, and 26.)

In Christian doctrine, peace can mean a number of things. It can mean freedom

from inner turmoil, and it can mean the state of good favor and harmony between God and man brought about through the reconciling death of Jesus Christ on the cross and experienced by believers when they turn away from sin and believe in Christ. It describes a believer's relationship with God in Christ, with fellow Christians, and with all people so far as it lies in a Christian's power to live at peace with everyone. It also describes a believer's own spiritual harmony with himself and includes freedom from a sense of guilt and from inner conflict.

Our peace results



from God's reconciling the world to Himself through His Son as well as from our faith in the Lord Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sins. St. Paul writes, "Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (*Romans 5:1*). This is the fundamental meaning of peace: the good relationship we have with God because our relationship with Him has been restored through the atoning death of Jesus Christ and because we have come to experience that peace through faith in Him.

The peace that we have with God through

our Lord Jesus Christ must also be expressed in our relationships with fellow-Christians and, as far as possible, with all people. As Jesus tells His disciples, "Salt is good: but if the salt have lost its saltness, wherewith will ye season it? Have salt in yourselves,

and have peace one with another" (*St. Mark* 9:50). Like the Hebrew concept of *shalom*, Christian peace must be expressed in our relationships. The peace we have with one another is like the salt that seasons the sacrifice; it seasons our lives as a

(Continued from page 1) living sacrifice to God. The fact that Jesus had to tell His disciples, "Have peace one with another" means that Christians have to ensure that they are at peace with one another— it is by no means an automatic virtue or grace!

In the *Book of Com*-

Peace, perfect peace, in this dark world of sin? The blood of Jesus whispers peace within.

Peace, perfect peace, by thronging duties pressed? To do the will of Jesus, this is rest.

Peace, perfect peace, with sorrows surging round? On Jesus' bosom naught but calm is found.

Peace, perfect peace, our future all unknown? Jesus we know, and He is on the throne.

Peace, perfect peace, death shadowing us and ours? Jesus has vanquished death and all its powers.

It is enough: earth's struggles soon shall cease, and Jesus call us to heaven's perfect peace.

mon Prayer, frequent references to peace occur. For example, the Collect for Peace in the Daily Office of Morning Prayer reminds us that God is "the author of peace and lover of concord", a phrase which underscores the importance of peace in relationships among people. In the same Office, the Prayer for the President of the United States, and all in Civil Authority (page 18) contains the petition "that... we may dwell secure in Thy peace." In this prayer, God's peace includes not only harmonious relationships at all levels of society within our country but also freedom from violence and war. The Prayer for all Conditions of Men includes these petitions for the Catholic (Universal) Church: "that all who profess and call themselves Christians may be led into the way of truth, and hold the faith in unity of spirit, in the bond of peace, and in righteousness of life" (pages 18-19). Our Collect for the Twenty-first Sunday after Trinity is a beautiful prayer linking the forgiveness of sins to peace and a "quiet mind". The Benediction at the end of Holy Communion, which quotes *Philippians* 4:7, blesses the people with God's peace. Finally, at the end of each service at St. Luke's, the words of the Dismissal, "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord", remind all of us that we are bearers of Christ's peace, and we carry that peace on our mission to the world.

But how shall we always be filled with peace?

Firstly, we must know that we have peace with

God through the Lord Jesus Christ and by our faith in Him. Faith in Christ is necessary if we are to experience that peace. Peace and trust in God are linked in *Isaiah* 26:3-4: "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace, whose mind *is* stayed on Thee: because he trusteth in Thee. Trust ye in the LORD forever: for in the LORD JEHOVAH is everlasting strength."

Secondly, we must aim, like St. Paul, to preserve a good conscience (Acts 23:1; II Corinthians 1:12; I Timothy 3:9) so that no persistent sinful habit may take hold of our mind and life and mar our peace with God. St. Paul clearly shows that all who are in the Lord Jesus Christ have peace since they live their lives in union with the Holy Spirit and directed by Him (*Romans* 8:1-2 ff.). Such a way of life embraces good relationships with fellow-Christians especially but also with family members, friends, and with all people as far as possible (*Romans* 12:18; I Thessalonians 5:15). This holy way of life is life-giving and peaceful, since the Holy Spirit directs it: For to be carnally minded is death; but to be spiritually minded is life and peace (Romans 8:6).

Thirdly, to continue living in the peace of the Holy Spirit, we must learn to abstain from all

(Continued from page 2) anxieties and instead submit our concerns and prayers to the Lord with thanksgiving and rejoicing (*Ephesians 5:18-20; I Thessalonians 5:16-18; Philippians 4:6-7; I Peter 5:6-7*), so expressing the trust in God which ensures peace.

All this is not easy, nor can these things be done just once and the machine switched on, as it were. Day by day, we must continue in peace with God. So we must persevere in times of peace and quiet with the Lord, reading the Bible meditatively, waiting on the Lord, and being attentive to the words of the Holy Spirit.

Christians are called to be "peacemakers" (*St. Matthew* 5:9), for such are the children of God. This does not mean that we are called to broker peace between one nation and another, but that all our behavior must make for peace, not discord and enmity. To do this, we lead our lives in a humble, gentle way, considering others better than ourselves, and not ourselves better than others. Let us encourage one another and so build up the Church of God, including this congregation of St. Luke's Chapel in the Hills.

Our St. Luke's Chapel has a Facebook page which was set up by Deacon Vogel and to which I try to contribute several times a week. Typical posts are of current events and our upcoming worship and program schedule, plus Collects of the Day and prayers. I have also launched a "Love Out Loud" Campaign, which shares inspiring quotes, comments, and suggestions to help us spread Christ's Love to the world

Beyond Facebook, there is another group which brings together neighbors: Nextdoor.com. If you are even a bit on the internet, this website may be of great interest to you. Nextdoor is a product of Facebook, but groups users by neighborhood and location, so that the news, commentary, and events are pertinent by locale. I will admit, that as with Facebook, there are some distractions of frivolous chatter and, unfortunately, over-the-fence bickering, but those things put aside, Nextdoor helps to unite folks in a neighborly way.

I encourage you to look into Nextdoor also, because it offers another forum for us, as a St. Luke's Chapel Family, to share our activities with others in our area. I do encourage all of us to use the site judiciously, but some of our activities such as our Craft Fair and even our Bible Study might be events that you would feel comfortable sharing with your neighbors—yet another way for us to use electronic/ social media to let our St. Luke's Light shine out into the Electronic World.
