A Message from the Rector: Our Response in Times of Plague

oday, as the world is faced with increasing numbers of Covid-19 cases and deaths from the Delta variant of the novel coronavirus, as well as with the appearance of the Lambda variant, I believe

it is appropriate to begin my article this month by quoting from the 1662 *Prayer Book* this truly relevant prayer to be used "In the time of any common Plague or Sickness."

O Almighty God, Who in

Thy wrath didst send a plague upon Thine own people in the wilderness, for their obstinate rebellion against Moses and Aaron; and also, in the time of king David, didst slay with the plague of pestilence threescore and ten thousand, and yet remembering Thy mercy didst save the rest: Have pity upon us miserable sinners, who now

now please Thee
to withdraw from
us this plague
and grievous
sickness; through
Jesus Christ our
Lord. Amen.

> This prayer is not afraid to admit the possibility that any current plague people may be facing could be the result of God's anger at His people's stubborn rebellion and willful, persistent sin. Such a conclusion

may be drawn from the Biblical record of God's infliction of plagues on His own people, Israel, at various times in their history. In *Numbers 11*, for example, after the people had complained to Moses about the lack of meat in

(Continued from page 1) the wilderness and God had brought them an abundance of quails, the people who had complained were struck dead by a plague (Numbers 11:32-33). Later, the ten spies who brought back a bad report of Canaan, and caused Israel to rebel against Moses and Aaron by refusing to enter the Promised Land, died of a plague before the Lord (Numbers 14:36-37). Also, when the congregation complained against Moses and Aaron, accusing them of killing God's people (referring to the sudden death of the rebellious Korah, Dathan, Abiram and others in Numbers 16), a plague broke out against the people. Moses commanded Aaron to take a censer, coals, and incense and make atonement for the people. Aaron did so, and the plague stopped, but only after fourteen thousand seven hundred people had died (Numbers 16:49). This prayer also alludes to the three-day plague inflicted on Israel because of King David's sin in a military census, which resulted in seventy thousand deaths, and stopped only because King David offered burnt offerings and peace offerings (II Samuel 24:25).

In the above prayer, it is also acknowledged that God's destroying Angel is responsible for a plague, but that a plague may be stopped by intercession based on the

atoning death of our Lord Jesus Christ. It is this prayer's attitude of humility before God, the acknowledgement of God's anger at our sin, and the truth that intercession based on Christ's atoning death can stop a plague, that make it a valuable prayer for use in our devotions.

But it is also useful to glean insights from the equivalent prayer "In Time of Great Sickness and Mortality" found in our 1928 *Prayer Book*.

O MOST mighty and merciful God, in this time of grievous sickness, we flee unto Thee for succour. Deliver us, we beseech Thee, from our peril; give strength and skill to all those who minister to the sick; prosper the means made use of for their cure; and grant that, perceiving how frail and uncertain our life is, we may apply our hearts unto that heavenly wisdom which leadeth to eternal life; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

page 45, **Book of Common Prayer**, 1928

This prayer does not take a theological position on the origin of plagues, but it appeals to God for

help and deliverance, intercedes for health workers and all who minister to the sick, and asks God to prosper, or make widely available, the means made use of for curing the plague, whatever they may be. But there is another important petition in this prayer, and that is that the faithful may wholeheartedly follow "that heavenly wisdom which leadeth to eternal life" in view of the frailty and uncertainty of our life in this world. Like the 1662 prayer, the 1928 prayer also pleads that God will deliver people from the sickness of the plague and stop the plague; the 1928 prayer, however, is also concerned with the importance of salvation and that each believer apply his heart to the heavenly wisdom of the Gospel that leads to eternal life. In this way, if anyone should suddenly die of sickness, he will have prepared himself to meet with the Lord in heaven. Spiritual preparation for death is not something that should be indefinitely postponed. Rather, when plague and sickness surround us, at least then, we should turn even more to the Lord and apply ourselves to our faith and to obeying God's word.

The 1662 prayer also lays before us the need to pray to God for our society and our world, to examine deeply— and let the

(Continued from page 2) Holy Spirit speak to us on this- the sins of this world in which we live. and to pray for all in authority in our cities, counties, and country, that we may live a godly and quiet life (I St. Timothy 2:1-3), not only as individuals but as communities and as a nation. We must pray for thorough repentance throughout our nation so that God may be glorified among us and so that everyone may live in a just society in which the freedoms of all are respected by all. For example, if more and more people are having to live in tents and RVs because their working incomes cannot keep pace with the cost of housing or living, something has gone terribly wrong. It may be argued that landlords must keep raising rents to pay their maintenance expenses, but if this trend continues, where will the poor live? How will they live? We will end up with a polarized society and an unjust one. But the standard God has set is this:

He hath shewed thee, O man, what is good; and what doth the LORD require of thee, but to do justly, and to love mercy, and to walk humbly with thy God? *Micah* 6:8, KJV

Just actions, merciful deeds, and walking humbly with God are vital for a healthy church and a healthy society! By our continuing intercession, our walk with the Lord, by our kind deeds, by our witness to Christ's righteous standard for church and society, let us persevere in being God's ambassadors to our generation!

highly recommend *Gospel Reset* by Ken Ham to help us effectively share a message of salvation with others.



My favorite aid to Bible study is the New King James Version Cultural Backgrounds Study Bible (Zondervan, 2017), since it contains many useful maps, charts, and articles on the customs, background, and history of Israel and the nations of the Ancient Near East, which throw light on many Biblical passages, particularly those in the Old Testament. For example, the article, "How the **Book of Job** Differs from Ancient Near Eastern Thinking" explains the difference in themes between the **Book of Job** and other ancient Mesopo-

tamian literature. Other interesting articles are "Writing Materials in the Ancient World" and "Tabernacles and the Promise of Living Water".

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app stores). At first glance it may seem like a Christian book-centric Kindle, and, you can certainly use it that way. But the real joy in using it is for the Bible- and commentary-specific features built into it. Reading a passage in the King James Version and something isn't clear? You can instantly pull up side-byside versions of the same passage in any translation you own (many are free). Select a word or phrase

and instantly bring up a concordance showing the original language of the phrase, the typical translation of that phrase, how that phrase is translated elsewhere in the same translation. and how it was used in other works from the same time period. You can also access any commentary you own that references or relates to the verses you


