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A Message from the Rector: Living as a New Creation through Jesus Christ

For the love of Christ constraineth us: because we thus judge, that if one died for all, then were all dead: And that He died for all, that they which live should not henceforth live unto themselves. but unto Him which died for them, and rose again. Wherefore henceforth know we no man after the flesh: yea, though we have known Christ after the flesh, yet now henceforth know we Him no more.

we Him no more. Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new. *II Corinthians*

5:14-17, кјv

his quotation briefly sketches a series of crucial aspects of how the Lord Jesus Christ's death and resurrection have brought new creation to everyone who is in Christ. The first of these aspects is that Christ's death for the salvation of all implied the death of



all mankind in Him. When Christ died on the cross, in a sense all people died to self and selfishness so that they might live again not for their own sake or for themselves, but for the sake of Christ Who died for them and rose again. St. Paul concludes that from now on we know no one "after the flesh," and though we have known Christ "after the flesh," we now no longer know Him as such. What did St. Paul mean by this? Through His own death on the cross, the Lord put to death a view of life and human beings, even of Himself, that is limited by our experience of earthly reality. The resurrection of the Lord Jesus

> Christ from the dead shows God's new creation, the creation of the spiritual or heavenly man, of whom Christ is the first fruits.

For all the faithful, this means both the birth of the hope of resurrection from the dead and

the new birth of every believer by the Holy Spirit in Christ, so that even now in this pilgrimage of faith ever since Holy Baptism with its accompanying faith in Christ and repentance from sin, every believer is a "new creature." The person who is in Christ by faith

(Continued from page 1) is born of water and of the Holy Spirit (St. John 3:5), that is, the Holy Spirit has given him new birth because he has put his faith in the Lord Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sins. The result of this is the passing away of old things-sinful, carnal attitudes, habits, and thoughts—from the Christian's way of life, and all priorities, attitudes and thoughts are being made new by the Lord through His word. Every Christian must make this new order of life a priority, as St. Paul

wrote to the Colossians:

> If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God. Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth. For ye are dead, and your life is hid with Christ in God. When Christ. Who is our life, shall appear, then shall ye also appear with Him in glory. Colossians 3:1-4, KJÝ

We must emulate the eternal virtues of Christ our Lord in our own lives and aim to please Him by living as subjects of God's Kingdom here on earth. By the way we live our lives it must be evident that the values of God's Kingdom, God's commands, and the teachings of the Lord Jesus Christ matter more to us than worldly priorities. Christians must renounce worldly priorities, such as materialism and the pursuit of pleasure, for the sake of God's kingdom. In the passage from Colossians 3, St. Paul explicitly declares that Christians have died, and their life is hidden with Christ in God (Colossians 3:3). This



means that Christians count themselves dead in terms of everything sinful and instead present themselves to God to do His will (*Romans 6:11-14*). Instead of being conformed to the sinful culture of the present age, Christians must be transformed by the renewal of their mind, so that they may prove by experience what the will of God is, which is good, pleasing to God, and perfect (see Ro*mans 12:2*). Now it is that, though our life as Christians is hidden with

Christ in God, we have Christ living in us through the Holy Spirit Who indwells every believer. This also is the hope that we have, that when the Lord Jesus Christ, Who is our life, comes again in glory, all believers will appear with Him in glory (*I Thessalonians 4:13-18*; *II Thessalonians 1:7-12*).

All of this means that we live life from the perspective of eternity and God's kingdom, and Christ governs or rules our life. Those whom we love, we not only love for

their own sake, but for the sake of the Lord Jesus Christ Who showed us God's love by dying on the cross for our redemption and deliverance from evil. Having come to be in Christ through faith, we now can never

lose Him. St. Augustine of Hippo wrote of this as follows:

> But blessed is the man that loves Thee, and his friend in Thee. and his enemy for Thee. For he alone loses none that is dear unto him, to whom all are dear, in him that can never be lost. And Who is this but our God. the God that made heaven and (Continues on page 3)

(Continued from page 2) earth, and Who filleth them, because in filling them He created them? Thee, no man loses, but he that lets Thee go. St. Augustine's *Confessions*

The person who loves God, and loves his friend in God and loves his enemy on account of God, essentially loses no-one that is dear to him, because all are dear to him in God, and he cannot lose God, Whom he loves

and in Whom he has believed. Even when bereaved, the believer is comforted by the presence of God, Who holds in the communion of the saints all the faithful departed. The promise of God is a new heaven and a new earth (Revelation 21:1) and His assurance to all His people is that He makes all things new (Revelation 21:5). Because of their repentance from sin, their baptism and their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, all Christians have been given

new birth and made new creatures. This process of being made new continues throughout their Christian journey on earth until they are given as their inheritance the new heaven and earth that God has created for all who love Him. In the meanwhile, let us make every effort to live as the new creatures we are called and created to be, living not for ourselves, but for the sake of Christ Who died for us and rose again.


