

A Message from the Rector: Jesus is the Door of the Sheep

Then said Jesus unto them again, Verily, verily, I say unto you, I am the door of the sheep. All that ever came before Me are thieves and robbers: but the sheep did not hear them. I am the door: by Me if any man enter in, he shall be saved, and shall go in and out, and find pasture. The thief cometh not, but for to steal, and to kill. and to destroy: I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly. I am the good shepherd: the good shepherd giveth His life for the sheep. St. John 10:7-11,

this short extract from the tenth chapter of the *Gospel according to St. John*, the Lord Jesus Christ states that He is both the door of the sheep and the good shepherd. The first

eternal life, the way to salvation and to communion with God the Father. As the sheep go in and out of the sheepfold by the door, so the faithful go about their daily work and enjoy their nightly rest by the grace and blessing of the Lord Jesus



of these two sayings, *I am* the door of the sheep, may be compared to "I am the way, the truth, and the life; no man cometh unto the Father, but by Me" (*St. John 14:6*, KJV). By door of the sheep, we can understand that the Lord Jesus is the gateway to heaven and to

Christ.

All the kings and leaders of Israel before Christ came were thieves and robbers (*St. John* 10:8), to whom the sheep, the people of Israel, paid no attention. What did the Lord mean by this? The

(Continued from page 1) Lord Jesus Christ alone had a completely pure motive of divine love in coming into the world; preaching the Gospel; teaching God's word and commandments; and eventually laying down His life for the world by dying on the cross. His sole purpose was to redeem mankind from sin and effect reconciliation with God and forgiveness of sins for everyone who believes in Him. Describing the leaders that came before Him, whether they were kings, priests, or prophets, as thieves and robbers, the Lord Jesus Christ intended to convey that all these leaders were sinful and to a greater or lesser degree exploited God's people for their own gain. The result was that the people of God did not listen to them.

Entering heaven by the door means entering by the Lord Jesus Christ, that is, by repenting of sin, believing in the Lord Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sins, and by receiving Him as Lord (*St. John 1:12; 3:16-17, 36*). Those who enter by Christ the door shall be saved and shall "find pasture," (*St. John 10:9c*, KJV) which means spiritual life and sustenance.

By contrast, the Devil and all who are motivated by him have a sinister agenda: to steal, to kill, and to destroy (*St. John 10:10a*). There are many in this world who have this purpose. Whenever

any murder, including a school shooting massacre such as the one that just happened in Uvalde, Texas, is committed, the same purpose is evident—to steal life, kill people, and destroy their future on earth. Not only that, but whenever people are bullied, slandered, exploited, deliberately underpaid, rejected for being poor or for being aliens or for being Christians, the same evil and destructive purposes are at work.

But the Lord Jesus Christ has come to give people life, so that they may have abundant and eternal life in communion with God and with all believers (**St. John** 10:10). Instead of destroying life, stealing, and killing, the Lord Jesus gives abundant life to all who believe in Him and receive Him as Lord. He has given His own life, that all people may receive forgiveness of sins and eternal life through Him. Therefore, He is rightly the Good Shepherd (St. John 10:11).

Since we do believe in the Lord Jesus Christ and are following Him as Lord, we must make every effort to reflect His lifegiving purpose in the Church and in the world. We must all live close to the Lord Jesus Christ by obeying His commands and reaching out to those around us with His divine love, remembering all the while that we are engaged in a great spiritual battle, not against people, but

against the spiritual hosts of evil (*Ephesians* 6:10-20).

The poet T.S. Eliot reminded his readers of the perpetual struggle of Good and evil in this world and wrote of the desert not only being in remote areas of the southern tropics but also "squeezed in the tubetrain next to you, the desert is in the heart of your brother" ("Choruses from 'The Rock'", I). There is a great, wide desert in the hearts of many people today, many who have suffered the stealing, killing, and destroying acts of the Devil at work through sinful people. What great miracles can be done in their lives by reaching out to them in the love of God!

The Holy Spirit both empowers us to reach out to people in love and equips us with His gifts of grace (I Corinthians 12:1-11; **Romans** 12:3-8; Ephesians 4:11; I St. **Peter** 4:10-11). Each of us has received different spiritual gifts in addition to the natural abilities God has given us so that we may proclaim and share the Gospel with others and edify our fellow-believers. We see from all the violence, cruelty, and injustice in this world that there is an urgent need for people to hear and receive the Gospel. Scripture warns us that people will often oppose our witness to Christ

(Continued from page 2) or mock it, but we must step out, firm in faith, constant in prayer and intercession for those who do not believe in Christ.

We must ask ourselves how we can direct people to the Lord and Savior of the world, Jesus Christ. First, we ourselves must love God with our whole being, and love our neighbor as we love ourselves. In our hearts, the Lord Jesus Christ must have full control. Day by day we must come before Him in prayer, listening in silence to His Holy Spirit speaking God's word to us. We must let the living water that is the Holy Spirit (St. John 7:39) wash over our soul, cleansing us from

all sins, and healing us of all hurts so that we can be instruments of God's healing in the lives of others. I end with this prayer attributed to St. Francis:

Lord, make us instruments of Your peace.

Where there is hatred, let us sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is discord, union; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy.


Grant that we may not so much

seek to be consoled as to console; to be understood as to understand; to be loved as to love.

For it is in giving that we receive; it is in pardoning that we are pardoned; and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life. Amen.

Mea Culpa

istory tells the sorrowful story: Even when the total human population was two and they lived in a perfect paradise, it has been our tendency to attempt to dodge personal responsibility for our own choices to sin.

Adam said, "It was this woman's fault. She gave me the fruit, and I ate it" (*Genesis 3:12*).

The woman who would soon be named Eve said, "The snake tricked me, and I ate" (*Genesis 3:13*).

The subtext, of course, is "You told me not to eat that particular fruit, Lord, and I did hear You. I ate it anyway, but it wasn't my fault."

And we have all done this, haven't we? Each of us has pointed the finger of blame at anyone other than ourselves at least once in our lives. I am not trying to cast stones here. I only want to remind myself and you that God keeps at us until we confess the truth to ourselves and to Him. He holds us accountable to ourselves, to others, and to Him.

I deliberately put the direct objects of that last sentence in that order. I can't change anyone other than myself, and I can't do even that by myself. I need the help of God's Word to renew my mind (**Romans** 12:2). I need the indwelling Holy

Spirit to remind me of my identity as a Christian and to speak to me sharply when I want to turn away from God and go my own way (St. John 14:17; 16:8 -11). I need my Chapel Family to bear with me when I must confess my sins before you (St. James 5:16), and I need the blood of Christ Jesus to wash me clean of the ugliness and stench of sin (*Revelation 1:5*). But, God help me, it really does start with me. I must first admit my failures to myself.

So do we all. The very beginning of repentance is admitting that we have done wrong and choosing to change our behavior (*Acts* 2:37-38).

We live in a fallen world full of encouragement to think, speak, and behave sinfully. Have you ever thought the world would be a better place if only that one certain someone weren't in it? How many times have vou heard someone declare, "I would kill for a [whatever]"? Maybe you've noticed how often others avoid the confrontations which really must take place in favor of initiating altercations over truly trivial matters. These are just examples. I simply want us all to consider how often and how carelessly we let ourselves slide. "It's only a thought," we tell ourselves, or "Come on, it's just a figure of speech." We even reassure ourselves (as if we had the

prerogative to judge), "So -and -so had it coming, so I was right to treat them spitefully." Sin is insidious and temptation is ever-present, but the truth is that sin is sin and our self -justifications don't fool God. We shouldn't let them fool us, either.

I'm not in a good

place right now. Things are happening in my life that I would not choose, and I have been and am seriously tempted to respond badly. Resistance is hard. It takes work, and I am ultimately the one who has to do it. God promises us an escape route when we are tempted (I Corinthians 10:13), but I have to look for that way out and then use it no matter how difficult the first step may be. When I want to spew my hurt feelings like a supervolcano, I have to cling with every fiber to the admonition to speak the truth with love (Ephesians 4:15). When the thought of retaliation entices, I must choose to take every thought and impulse captive to the obedience of Christ (II *Corinthians* 10:5). I have to keep reminding myself that sin lies at my door like a lion waiting to devour me but that God says I must overrule it by every means necessary (*Genesis* 4:7).

So I have to curb my thoughts. Breaking an evil thought train for me sometimes means reciting

(Continued from page 4) **Psalm** 23 or singing Hymn 301 (Immortal, invisible, God only wise) through all four verses. For certain it always involves prayer. Fighting to not speak the wrong words can mean actually holding my hands over my mouth or praying "Your words, Lord, said Your way in Your perfect time" when I answer my phone or begin to respond to an e-mail. Keeping myself from running after evil might mean wearing a cross as a physical reminder to myself of my identity as a called child

of God. Sometimes resisting my temptations needs the assistance of the Church. The fight *always* needs God. I am only more than a conqueror because I am leaning on Him (*Romans* 8). I have to confess my need for Him to myself, to you, and to Him. Confession is the beginning of repentance, and repentance is the beginning of spiritual growth.

God is our Father. He joyfully adopts all who believe in and follow Christ (*Galatians 4:4-7*). Jesus is our Brother! Isn't

that glorious? But family members have responsibilities. As children of God, one of ours is to work out our salvation in fear and trembling (*Philippians 2:12-15*). A spiritual examen, a holding oneself responsible for one's choices and admitting our failings, is a practice which helps us to keep short accounts with God because it drives us to our knees. I need to make certain I am doing this at least once daily.

as well as all those who are any ways afflicted, or distressed, in mind, body, or estate; especially those for whom our prayers are desired:




