A Message from the Rector: Using Lent for the Renewal of the Mind

-re you ready for Lent? This year, after only three Sundays after Epiphany, the Pre-Lenten period beginning with Septuagesima Sunday is upon us, and Ash Wednesday falls on February 14th. The names for the Pre-Lenten Sundays-Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Ouinquagesima— are the Latin words for seventieth, sixtieth, and fiftieth respectively, since Septuagesima is approximately seventy days before Easter, Sexagesima is approximately sixty days before Easter, and Quinquagesima, exactly fifty. The First Sunday in Lent used to be known as Quadragesima, to indicate approximately the fortieth day before Easter. The Pre-Lenten Sundays originated in the Roman liturgy and were incorporated in the medieval Missals, and then in the Prayer Book. These Sundays originated in the sixth

century, soon after the Lombards invaded Italy (568 AD) (p. 118, Massey Hamilton Shepherd, Jr.: *The Oxford American Prayer Book Commentary*. New York: Oxford University Press, Fifth printing, 1955). The Collects for the Pre-Lenten Sundays reflect the hardships and tribulations in



Italy in the late sixth century.

As the Pre-Lenten period grew from historical circumstances in Italy in the sixth century, one might ask what the purpose is of retaining the Pre-Lenten period. In modern Anglican Prayer Books, there is no PreLenten season. I contend, however, that in view of man's sinful nature altogether evident in the world today, more emphasis on penitence, prayer, and drawing close to God cannot do us any harm. If we are sincere in our efforts, the Pre-Lenten period helps us get ready for Lent.

My initial question "Are you ready for Lent?" poses to each of us another question, the question of how we are going to observe Lent this year. Though prayer and fasting immediately come to mind when one thinks of Lent. what one needs to do is to decide beforehand what disciplines of prayer and fasting one will use. What extra time will we set aside for prayer? Which books will we read to help us in our prayer life and spiritual

Another useful discipline will be to read more of the Bible this Lent. Then we also should ask ourselves what commen-

taries or study aids we will use to gain a clearer understanding of the passages that we read.

Not only prayer and Bible study, but also the whole way we live out our faith merits our attention this Lent. What changes can each of us make to be a better person? We can begin by examining our thoughts, intentions, and attitudes and conforming them to the mind of Christ our Lord. St. Paul addresses this matter in his first epistle to the Church in Corinth:

> For though we walk in the flesh, we do not war after the flesh: (For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strong holds;) Casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ.

I Corinthians 10:3-5, KJV

The weapons about which St. Paul writes in this passage are spiritual weapons, in particular the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God (*Ephesians 6:17b*). It is the word of God that assavs and tests all our thoughts and words. The destruction of strongholds refers to the elimination of sinful patterns of thinking and mental attitudes that conflict with the word of God. As this passage indicates, we ourselves must take authority over our own minds and take down thoughts and attitudes which we know to be contrary to the commandments and teachings of the Lord Jesus Christ. Each believer must do this for himself before an evil stronghold becomes firmly entrenched in his mind. As Christians, we have authority and responsibility to conform our thought life to Christ's character. teaching, and commandments. We must not simply let our thoughts be influenced by the prevailing culture. St. Paul makes this point in *Romans* 12:

I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God.

Romans 12:1-2, KJV

In this attitude of total surrender and commitment to God, we allow the word of God, the Bible as we have it, to renew our mind so that we may find out by godly discernment what is the good, acceptable, perfect will of God. If we conform ourselves to this world, that is, to the world that is hostile to God, we are listening too much to the many voices of this world, but if we are being transformed by the renewing of our mind, it comes from filling our thoughts with Holy Scripture and from spending time in prayer. The word of God quickly reveals our thoughts for what they truly are and indicates how much we need to change:

> For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any two-edged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart. Hebrews 4:12, KJV

This Lent we must allow the Holy Spirit to use His sword (God's word) to discern the thoughts and intentions of our hearts, so that we

may be changed and renewed and have our minds conformed to the mind of Christ. To do this effectively, we must set aside sufficient time to read, study, and meditate on God's word. In the Middle Ages, the concept of *lectio divina* as applied to the reading of the Bible was taught and practiced. *Lectio divina* is a four-step process which is still useful today:

- 1. *lectio* reading the passage;
- 2. *meditatio* pondering and reflecting on the passage;
- 3. *oratio* praying on the passage; and
- 4. *contemplatio* – waiting on God to speak

through the passage. Whatever methods we use to read, study, and apply Holy Scripture to our lives, this Lent let us be determined to let God's word reform and renew our minds, and so lead us to be

conformed to the image of Christ in all we think, say, or do! - The Reverend

Acolytes

Acolytes serve during the worship service by assisting the priest at the altar. If you are interested in joining this ministry, please see our Rector for more information and training.

Altar Guild

The Altar Guild procures and maintains supplies for worship services. Guild members prepare the altar for services and clean and put away its furnishings after use. If you wish to offer flowers, please sign up for the date of your choice on the Flower Chart in the narthex and let our Rector know your intentions. If you would like to serve on the Altar Guild, please speak to Father Parrish. Training will be provided.

Bulletin Boards

The parish has three bulletin boards which are variously used to share news and to educate members . The Bulletin Boards ministry maintains and updates the displays.

Children's Loose Change Ministry

The Loose Change Ministry is designed to help the children of the parish learn how to live the Gospel by putting them in charge of their own ministry. Parishioners and guests may donate pocket change each Sunday by putting it in the designated jar in the narthex. When the jar becomes heavy, the change is counted and rolled, and the children decide for themselves how it can best be used.

Community Mission Projects

Once a quarter, the Vestry selects a special Community Missions Project and solicits donations to that project from the congregation. If you have a suggestion for such a project, please contact any member of the Vestry.

Community Outreach Committee

Community Outreach Committee members brainstorm and implement ideas to assist the parish in fulfilling our Lord's command to "go and make disciples" (*St. Matthew* 28:19) by inviting new people to worship with us and encouraging them to learn more about Christ by becoming members of His Church..

Cupboard Keeper

Cupboard Keepers regularly check and replenish kitchen and restroom supplies.

Easter Sunday Egg Hunt

Members of this ministry fill and hide plastic eggs for the traditional Egg/ Treasure Hunt for our younger members on Easter Sunday.

Emergency Food Pantry

Donations of nonperishable foodstuffs are accepted each Sunday and delivered to the Downtown Palo Alto Food Closet for distribution to the needy in our area. Please place your donations of nonperishable foodstuffs in

the wicker basket on the floor in the narthex.

Empty Pill Bottle Collection

Empty pill bottles with caps are sent to Matthew 25: Ministries for shipment in medical supply kits to underserved communities worldwide. A collection box is available in the narthex.

The Chapel's flagpole was erected on the site of the original Old Purissima Schoolhouse water tower. Gardening

Gardeners install and maintain the plants around the grounds and keep the chapel's small lawn tidy using the parish's lawnmower. If you wish to garden for God by serving in this ministry of beautification, please contact the Junior Warden.

Greeting Cards

The Greeting Cards ministry collects signatures for and mails birthday, anniversary, and other special occasion cards to members of the parish. If you are new to the parish, please see Kim Vogel to have your family's names and important dates added to the Greeting Cards ministry list.

Hospitality - Potlucks

The Potluck Hospitality Team hosts the parish's various special fellowship events, including the Pancake Luncheon, British Day, and International Day. They also coordinate food and beverage donations and organize set-up and clean-up crews.

The Sunday Hospitality Team hosts the fellowship period after each worship service, coordinates food and beverage donations, and organizes set-up and clean-up crews.

Housekeeping
