A Message from the Rector: Seek the Things that are Above

the Epistle for the principal service of Holy Communion on Easter Day, we find this command: "If ye then be risen with Christ, seek those things which are above, where Christ sitteth on the right hand of God" (Colossians 3:1, KJV). Ascension, as John Calvin notes in his commentary on this verse, accompanies resurrection. Since in spirit we have risen with Christ in His resurrection, as in Holy Baptism we were united with Christ in His death and resurrection (Romans 6:3-5; Colossians 2:12-13), so in spirit we have ascended with Christ to God's right hand.

It is significant, though, that St. Paul begins this verse with *If ye then be risen with Christ*, as if to hint at the possibility that some of his readers might not think or believe that they have risen with Christ. This reflects the sad reality that though, in theory, Christians believe they have been raised to life

with Christ in a spiritual sense and will be fully raised to life in a new spiritual body at the resurrection, in practice many Christians find themselves immersed in worldly affairs and concerns. It takes great determination and resolve always to "seek the things that are above."

But what is meant by

seeking the things that are above? In today's English, "aim to obtain" or "desire to possess" may be a more accurate

translation of the Greek verb as it is used in this verse. St. Paul amplifies the meaning further in the next verse: "Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth" (*Colossians 3:2*, KJV). I think the New Revised Standard Version's translation is more helpful here: "Set your minds on things that are

above, not on things that are on earth." Now all of us must be concerned about things that pertain to earning a living, paying bills, and doing our duties as we live life on this earth, but our ultimate priority must be to love God wholeheartedly.

If we are to appreciate the depths of what it means to seek the things



that are above, we must begin with God. In *Psalm* 37:4, we read this exhortation:

Trust in the LORD, and do good; so shalt thou dwell in the land, and verily thou shalt be fed. Delight thyself also in the

LORD; and He shall give thee the desires of thine heart.

Psalm 37:3-4, KJV

Trusting in the Lord, doing good, and delighting in the Lord are the key elements of this verse, resulting in God's provision and gift of fulfilling the desires of one's heart. Delighting in the to have anxieties about material things that people need, such as food and clothing, He adds this command: "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and His righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you" (*St. Matthew* 6:33, KJV). Now the kingdom of God is the rule, or reign, of God. In the Lord's Prayer, we pray "Thy kingdom

people say, "Look, here it is!" or "There it is!" Instead, the kingdom of God is among (or within) God's people (*St. Luke 17:20-21*). What this means for us is that we prioritize the values of God's kingdom in our lives and obey God's will.

This means that it is not sufficient for us to hear or read God's com-

And He shall bring it to pass.

He shall bring forth your righteousness as the light,

And your justice as the noonday.

Psalm 37:3-6

Lord as expressed in the Hebrew here implies a spontaneous relationship of enjoying God and delighting in Him. This goes together with trust and confidence in Him which are enhanced by doing good – that is, by doing all that pleases God.

Secondly, when our Lord Jesus Christ is teaching His disciples not come." What do we mean by that? We pray that God's rule over the whole universe will come so that we may live in peace, justice, harmony, and righteousness under the rule of Christ the King forever. However, when the Pharisees asked Jesus when the kingdom of God was coming, He answered that it is not coming with observable signs, nor will

mandments: Rather, we must obey them. In *I St. John 2:17*, we read that he who does the will of God abides forever. *St. James 1:22* confirms that Christians must be doers of God's word, not hearers only. We must therefore, continually offer ourselves to God to do His will. We need to find out what God's will is for our lives. We shall do this

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by renewing our minds through daily reading and study of God's Word and by continual prayer. So important is the knowledge of God's will and obedience to it, that St. Paul includes it in his prayer for the Colossian Christians:

> For this cause we also, since the day we heard it, do not cease to pray for you, and to desire that ye might be filled with the knowledge of His will in all wisdom and spiritual understanding; that ye might walk worthy of the Lord unto all pleasing, being fruitful in every good work, and increasing in the knowledge of God: strengthened with all might, according to His glorious power, unto all patience and longsuffering with joyfulness;

Colossians 1:9-

St. Paul's prayer for the Colossians to be filled with the knowledge of God's will in full wisdom and spiritual understanding will result in a way of life that pleases the Lord and bears an abundant harvest of good deeds, which will in turn cause them to grow in the knowledge of God and in the exercise of the virtues of the Holy Spirit.

The virtues of the Holy Spirit will be produced in our lives by the indwelling Spirit as we

may

cooperate with Him in every area of our lives and set our minds on the things that are above, not on the things that are on earth. These virtues are the fruit of the Spirit:

> But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance:

against such there is no law.

Galatians 5:22-23, KJV

Seeking the things that are above includes also practicing and exercising these virtues of the Holy Spirit in all the varied circumstances and relationships of our lives. Exercising these virtues, including patience or longsuffering, produces character and character,

hope (Romans 5:4). The hope of our eternal inheritance in God's kingdom is also one of the virtues of God's kingdom that we strengthen through continuing steadfast obedience to God in the face of various trials.

It is important that we continue to seek the things that are above by loving God whol-

ly and loving our neighbor as we love ourselves (St. Matthew 22:37-40). To seek the Lord, writes St. Augustine of Hippo, is to seek a blessed life, and the purpose of seeking God is for our soul to live. (St. Augustine: Confessions, Book X.20). Many people agree that it is worth attaining the blessed life but differ on how to reach it. Ideally. one should not only have the hope of a blessed life,


but also the experience of it. Because the blessed life includes delighting in the truth, and God is truth, to seek a blessed life is to seek God. Many do not really want a blessed life because they do not want God. Augustine concludes that God's ideal servant is the one

who no longer looks to hear from God the answer that he wants but rather to want what he hears from God (St. Augustine: *Confessions*, Book X.26). This is really the crux of seeking God, His kingdom, His will, and the things that are above. We must sincerely desire

God's word to us instead of expecting God to speak words that conform to our will rather than His.

Archbishop Beach's Call to Prayer



Lenten greetings in the Name of Christ Jesus our Savior and only Lord!!

I am writing to you to ask that you join me in a **Season of Prayer** as we enter into an important time in the life of the Anglican Church in North America (ACNA). As you may know, my second term as the Archbishop and Primate of the ACNA will end this coming June. The College of Bishops will meet in Conclave beginning on June 20th at St. Vincent's Archabbey in Latrobe, Pennsylvania ,to seek the Lord and select our new Archbishop. This will be followed by our Provincial Assembly (June 26-28), our ACNA family gathering, at the conclusion of which our new Archbishop will begin his term.

Beginning with the Season of Easter starting March 31st and continuing through Pentecost until June 20th, I am calling on the members of the ACNA to set aside each Wednesday or Friday (or both) to spend time in prayer (and fasting for those who are able), while also adding a petition in each Sunday's Prayers of the People, for the bishops as we seek the Lord for my successor. I am asking each member, rector, pastor, bishop, priest, deacon, prayer group, Bible Study, and intercessor in the Province to make this a priority starting Easter Sunday.

We know that God responds to the prayers of His people (*St. Mathew* 7:7-8; *St. James* 5:16; *Ephesians* 3:20-21; *Jeremiah* 33:3), and we all desire that the bishops hear from the Lord when we gather in Conclave. The ACNA and the College of Bishops have made it a point not to have campaigning and political posturing as part of this process. Rather, we will be seeking to hear from the Lord as to whom He has anointed for this next season of the Church.

As the Lord said to the prophet Jeremiah: "Call unto Me and I will answer you, and show you great and mighty things which you do not know" (*Jeremiah 33:3*),

ne of the books to which I listened during Lent is I am a Church Member: Discovering the Attitude that Makes the Difference by Thom S. Rainer. In it, Pastor Rainer outlines six attitudes and responsibilities of those who join a body of believers.

It's a quick read (or listen), and I recommend it to all of you—whether you are a new member of the church or have been growing in Christ for several decades.

As I listened to one of his lessons, I realized that I have been neglecting something very important: praying for my pastors. I mean, I do offer a hearty *amen* when we pray for them in our wor-

ship services, but I hadn't been devoting a daily prayer for the protection and provision of the men who have answered God's call to shepherd my spiritual health and growth. The reasons why we should pray for our pastors really struck me. Pastor Rainer says that he asks all his church mem-
