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# A Message from the Rector: Lent, Passiontide, and Easter

*L* very year the Church provides the opportunity, especially through Lent and Passiontide, for us all to obey more fully the Lord Jesus Christ's call, "Repent: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (*St. Matthew 4:17b*, KJV). The Greek verb for *repent* expresses

a complete change of heart, encompassing not only sorrow for sin but abhorrence of it, a complete turning away from sin to God and His righteousness. In the Daily Offices of Morning and Evening Prayer and in the service of Holy Communion, the

Prayer Book furnishes us with a structured prayer (the General Confession) to confess our sins frequently, but the determination to repent and the implementation of repentance in our lives are our responsibility. In Christ we have been given a brand-new identity:

But ye are a cho-

sen generation, a royal priesthood, an holy nation, a peculiar people; that ye should shew forth the praises of Him who hath called you out of darkness into His marvellous light. *I St. Peter 2:9*, KJV



Let us consider the details of the meaning of this verse. First of all, Christians are "a chosen generation." This means that all Christians, of whatever nationality, race, culture, or language, make up the elect offspring of God. We are a whole new race of people. We have been born again, born anew, born of the Holy Spirit (*St. John 3:3, 3:5-6*). God has chosen all His people and given them new birth by His Holy Spirit. This implies that we have a spiritual unity beyond ourselves, created and given by God to all believers.

Secondly, Christians are "a royal priesthood."

This description (in the form "a kingdom of priests") was first used of the nation of Israel in *Exodus 19:6*. The phrase indicates the priesthood of all believers. Since all Christians are priests, we must understand what this priestly ministry entails. All

priests must know God's Word and be able to share it with others. It is our business to know the content of our faith, the prayers we have learned, and the commandments of God, as well as the teachings of Christ and His apostles. Then priests offer sacrifices to God. All believers, then, are called to offer their bod-

ies (themselves) to God day by day as a living sacrifice (Romans 12:1). To this end, we must not be conformed to this present age and its sinful culture but be transformed by the renewing of our mind through the reading and study of God's Word and by continual prayer. As priests of Jesus Christ the King, we must also offer Him the sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving (I Thessalonians 5:16-18; Ephesians 5:19-20). Not only does this mean continually praising and thanking God in our daily lives, but also partaking frequently in the Sacrament of Holy Communion, which is itself a sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving, according to this petition in the Prayer of Consecration:

> And we earnestly desire Thy fatherly goodness, mercifully to accept this our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving.

Christians are thirdly "an holy nation." This identity was at first given to the nation of Israel on condition that they obeyed God's voice and kept His covenant (*Exodus 19:5-6*). Now, by being in Christ by being baptized into union with Him in the Sacrament of Holy Baptism (*Romans* 6:1-11), Christians are all one holy nation in the Lord Jesus Christ. Our nationality as Christians is far more important than our earthly nationality or citizenship since it is eternal and transcends all national boundaries. We can even say that our Christian nationality is global. This has profound implications for our attitude towards Christians of all nations. Just because they speak different languages, have different cultures, or are poor, does it mean they are inferior to American Christians? By no means! In God's kingdom, all are sinners saved by grace, all are adopted as God's children.

Lastly, Christians are called "a peculiar people" in *I St. Peter 2:9*. This does not mean they are strange people. The Greek used for this phrase translates better as "a people for God's own possession." Again, this description was used first of the nation of Israel in *Exodus 19:5*:

> Now therefore, if ye will obey My voice indeed, and keep My covenant, then ye shall be a peculiar treasure unto Me above all people: for all the earth is Mine.

*Exodus* 19:5, KJV

Just as ancient Israel was intended by God to be His chosen people, a treasure more precious than any other nation, so now in Christ the Lord, all who believe have that calling through the Holy Spirit indwelling them and bringing them into full obedience to God's commandments.

All this has farreaching consequences for how we view ourselves and other Christians and how we relate to them. For example, do we assume far too easily that there are very few Christians among the unemployed, or the homeless, or people of other nations, or among Democrats, or among Republicans? We will find Christians among all these groups and in both political parties. Even when two nations are at war, there may be Christians on both sides, in both armies. While one nation may be more in the wrong than the other in initiating or fighting the war than the other, one cannot write off all the people of one nation as non-Christian.

Finally, let us return to how we are to live out our calling as Christians. Lent and Passiontide bring into focus our call to follow the Lord Jesus Christ and obey Him fully, just as He fully obeyed the Father and was obedient even unto death, death on a cross (*Philippians 2:8*). Our vocation embraces our love for God, which must

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be wholehearted (*Deuteronomy* 6:4-5); our love for our neighbor (*Leviticus* 19:18); and our love for fellow Christians (*St. John* 13:34), just as the Lord Jesus Christ loves God, all humanity, and His followers. Our Savior has shown us show to live, and we are to follow His example.

For many Christians in the world, especially those in countries where

they are persecuted, Lent and Passiontide seem to continue year-round. We must pray for them, giving thanks also for their courage and witness for Christ in their times of trial. We also must pray for ourselves, Christians in the West, as opposition to the Christian faith from our culture grows stronger and Biblical illiteracy more widespread. Let us pray that our own witness for the Lord Jesus Christ will be more determined

and effective in the face of the spiritual warfare that we face.

Though we celebrate Easter every year, there is a revival coming, a renewal of Christian faith. Let each of us be vigilant, on the watch spiritually, and praying for God's kingdom to come in us and in the world around us.
