A Message from the Rector: Reflections on Deuteronomy 10:17-21

2 he propers (liturgy appointed for a particular day) for Independence Day were included first in the 1928 **Book of Common Pray**er. The 1789 **Prayer Book** had no commemoration of Independence Day, since it was a matter of political controversy

among clergy—many of whom had been Loyalists during the period immediately after the Revolutionary War. In the 1928 *Prayer Book*, Independence Day is a votive, or commemo-

ration, but in the 1979 **Prayer Book** it is regarded as a festival. The propers used for the day in the 1928 **Prayer Book** include **Deuteronomy** 10:17-21, on which I shall now offer a few reflections. Here is the King James Version of the passage:

For the LORD

your God is God of gods, and Lord of lords, a great God, a mighty, and a terrible, which regardeth not persons, nor taketh reward: He doth execute the judgment of the fatherless and widow, and loveth the by His name. He is thy praise, and He is thy God, that hath done for thee these great and terrible things, which thine eyes have seen.

In the verse preceding this passage, the Holy Spirit commands the people of Israel not to be stiff



stranger, in giving him food and raiment. Love ye therefore the stranger: for ye were strangers in the land of Egypt. Thou shalt fear the LORD thy God; Him shalt thou serve, and to Him shalt thou cleave, and swear -necked, or proud and stubborn. The first verse of this passage states why the people should not be stubborn: The LORD their God is "God of gods, and Lord of lords, a great God, a mighty

and a terrible, which regardeth not persons, nor taketh reward" (*Deuteronomy* 10:17). It should be abundantly clear to us today, that the authors of the 1928 *Prayer Book* did not believe these words applied only to Israel. They realized that just as Israel had a vocation to

be obedient to God since it was His chosen nation, so, derivatively, the United States of America has a vocation to be obedient to God since it is "one nation under God". The doctrine of American exceptionalism must be subject to the Biblical doctrine of God's impartiality and His love of people of all nations. America remains always both the object of God's love and of His scrutiny. He is the wholly just, supreme God who cannot be corrupted with a bribe or influenced to compromise His justice or holiness. In all our dealings as individuals and in our dealings as a nation with people of other nations, we must remember who God is, to whom we belong as a nation, and the love and justice that He requires of His people.

Since God is supremely just and gives judgment for orphans, widows, and aliens and loves them (in ancient Israel these people were often the poorest), we should treat these groups of people with justice and love also. This includes those widowed or orphaned because their spouses or parents died in action in the military or in their duties as police officers or firefighters.

In particular, the command is given to Israel to love the stranger, or alien, since the Israelites themselves were once aliens in Egypt (*Deuteronomy 10:19*). A parallel can be drawn to the citizens of the United States, many of whose ancestors came from various nations of the world to make a new life in this land. Therefore, because God is love, because we are answerable to God as a nation, and especially since many of us are Christians, we must love immigrants, aliens, and strangers because God has given us this command.

Political ideology in this regard should never outweigh the Biblical imperative to show love to all. If we are to be obedient to God's commands, we should not have any immigration policy that separates children from their parents, since this is like making temporary orphans out of children and causes them needless distress and anguish. Always we must remember that God loves the alien and gives him food and clothing (**Deuteronomy** 10:18). The Greek word for hos*pitality* literally means "love of strangers", and the command to show such hospitality is reiterated in the New Testament because it is central to the Christian way of life. Four passages which highlight how important hospitality is are St. Matthew 5:46-48; Romans 12:13; Hebrews 13:2; and I St. Timothy 3:2.

As if to remind God's people of the motivation for their love and obedience and that no other loyalty should cause them to deviate from this imperative, the Holy Spirit adds the command to hold God in awe, serve Him, and be loyal to Him since God is the object of their praise and their God, who has done for them the wonders that they have seen (Deuteronomy 10:20-21). Similarly, as we remember all the wonderful things that God has done for us in this beautiful country and all the trials through which He has safely brought us, we must be unshrinkingly loyal to Him, loving Him wholly, and not allowing ourselves to be led astray by any worldly ideology or by anyone professing a greater claim on our loyalty and love than God Himself.

Furthermore, we must remember that all the freedoms we currently enjoy were won and maintained at great cost, the cost of many soldiers' lives in the Revolutionary War and subsequent wars. We must remember with gratitude all who have laid down their lives in the service of the United States of America, and all who currently serve in every branch of the Armed Forces. Let us not, by indifference to God and ingratitude for our heritage, forfeit the liberties we have received. An egalitarian society in which anyone who works hard can succeed without barriers of race, gender, class, national origin, religion or economy hampering him is a society to be prized indeed. A com-

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munity in which Christians of every denomination can gather and worship God freely is a blessed community indeed. There are countries in the world where Christians dare meet only in secret, and where they are bitterly persecuted for their faith.

Finally, let us pray that the citizens of the United States of America will always remember God's favor and be glad to do His will (Prayer for Our Country, page 36, The Book of Common Prayer, 1928), as well as have the grace to maintain in righteousness and peace the liberties won by their fathers (page 263, op. cit.). Let us also continue to pray for our President, Joe Biden, for Congress, for the State of California, for Governor Gavin Newsom, and for all in authority that they may seek God's will, know it, and do it.

Independence Day holds reminders of our history, our heritage, our liberties, and, above all, our nation's Christian origins, even though it was founded as a secular nation that provides for freedom of religious expression. Let this be a time in which we pray that many Americans return to God through the Lord Jesus Christ, and honor Him through lifelong obedience and service.

The Most Reverend Steve Wood, Archbishop and Primate of the Anglican Church in North America

he Anglican Church in North America has called the Right Reverend Stephen D. Wood as our next Archbishop and Primate. He has been the Bishop of the Diocese of the Carolinas since its formation in 2012, and has been the Rector of St. Andrew's, Mount Pleasant, South Carolina, since 2000. Wood succeeds Archbishop Foley Beach, who has served the constitutional maximum of two five-year terms. Following a summer sabbatical, Beach will continue as Bishop of the Anglican Diocese of the South.

"I can testify to the Holy Spirit's work in the election of Steve Wood," said Bishop Alex Farmer. "It was unexpected but clear. Steve is a gifted leader who will move us forward in mission. He is also the unifying bishop we need for the continued work God is calling the Anglican Church in North America to be about in this next season."

Bishop Wood received the Provincial Cross and the spiritual authority to take up the office of Archbishop and Primate from Archbishop Beach at the Provincial Assembly's Closing Eucharist on Friday, June 28th.

Vestry Matters

D ear fellow parishioners,

Welcome to the latest edition of "Vestry Matters". I hope you enjoyed the previous article and that you'll enjoy the current and future editions.

This and future articles will probably be a lot briefer than the initial one as I'll be concentrating on providing a summary of the most recent meeting of the Vestry, although that's not to say I won't be addressing topics I think may be of interest outside the scope of the regular meetings. That having been said, on with the latest article.

May 19th Vestry Meeting Summary

Those in attendance: Ray Boreham, Elodia Fernandez, Julia McNeely, Bridgitte Parrish, Father Chris Parrish, Clark Patteson, Deacon Peter Vogel, Bill Zahrt (Zoom), and Patsy Zahrt (Zoom).

Treasurer's Report:

 Elodia Fernandez reported that payments in the amount of \$616 were made to our new insurance carrier, CM Select. The annual premium we'll pay to this new carrier will be approximately \$2,400 as compared to the \$4,200 paid to our previous insurer, Guide-One, thus resulting in substantial annual savings.

- Net income for May so far was a positive \$1,836.84.
- Federal Income Taxes (quarterly estimated taxes) were paid in April (\$4,000)

and May; State Income Taxes were paid in April, and a refund was expected in May.

 AT&T payments for February, March, and April were in-kind donations by Deacon Vogel. Thanks to Deacon Vogel for his generous donation.

- The total market value of the Schwab account had increased since April 14th, when it stood at \$264,029.01, although no statement was available to show the amount of the increase.
 - Congratulations were extended to Father Parrish by the Vestry on the news that the loan extended to him for the legal expenses incurred in acquiring Permanent Resident status for both him and Bridgitte had been repaid in full.

Junior Warden's Report:

• Clark Patteson noted that our neighbor has finally agreed to pay for half of the fence. Work on the fence would start May 20th and be completed in three days. It will be an all-wood fence.

 AT&T has formally approved Dish Wireless coming onto their antenna, but Dish needs us to rent them ground space for their

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equipment. However, our telecommunications attorney warned us that Dish is likely to go bankrupt, and besides that, they like to haggle a lot. Since Clark has his hands full with the three current cell tower companies that lease from us, he did not think he could manage a fourth.

• AT&T has nearly finished upgrades to its antenna and is possibly close to finishing their landscaping project around the fake tree.

Altar Guild Report:

Elodia Fernandez mentioned that the busy Holy Week and Easter season was over. Ray Boreham expressed gratitude to her and all the members of the Altar Guild for their dedicaand hard tion work.

Rector's Report:

• Father Parrish noted that the average Service attendance at the end of April, including those attending via Zoom, was 18.

- Regarding the ReVive Program, we should develop and refine our Parish goals and vision statement (found at https:// stlukeschapel.org/ whoweare/ ourchurchvision/) before inviting Canon Mark Eldredge to visit us and lead the ReVive Program again. To this end, we need to own, articulate, and implement our vision statement. We each must be wholeheartedly committed to our Lord Jesus Christ.
- The Reverend Darryl Fitzwater will be examined by the ACNA College of Bishops before they give their consents to his election as Bishop-Coadjutor of our diocese. Father Parrish requested everyone to continue praying for Father Fitzwater. The College of **Bishops** meets from June 20th to 23rd, just before the Provincial Assembly meets. The bishops will also elect a new archbishop and primate for the province to re-

place Archbishop Foley Beach.

Other Business:

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Suggestions to focus on and pray for growing the Church include: 1) Setting up signs on street corners (Julia McNeely is working on these). Julia asked for measurements of our banners, as we need new ones. 2) Setting up a sign advertising our services by the mailbox. 3) Raising the flags before the service every Sunday. Julia requested patriotic hymns for Memorial Day weekend. 4) Dropping flyers off in surrounding neighborhood for special events/occasions. 5) Hosting social events in McNeely Hall. A projector and screen would be needed for film nights in McNeely Hall. Deacon Vogel said he would research these items and send an e-mail to the Vestry detailing his findings. 6) Allowing use of McNeely Hall for events deemed worthy. 7)

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Reaching out to Foothill College. In the past St. Luke's put fliers on notice boards on campus. 8) Forming a choir. 9) Establishing an Usher ministry.

These are just some of the ideas we as a Vestry have. If you have any other ideas or would like to help in this very important mission, please contact Father Parrish or any Vestry member. Better yet, join us at an upcoming meeting to offer vour ideas and suggestions in

person. The more help and input we can get, the better. Thank you in advance.

• Dish Wireless: After an extensive discussion, it was unanimously decided that, due to the uncertain future of Dish combined with their reputation for delaying payments to lessors, the Chapel will not allow Dish Wireless to lease ground space.
