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A Message from the Rector: Insights from the Preacher: Ecclesiastes 4

This month I continue consideration of insights from the *Book of Ecclesiastes* by focusing on Chapter 4. As I write this, tomorrow is Labor Day, and some of the Preacher's observations here relate to problems experienced by the workforce.

In verses 1-3 of *Ecclesiastes* 4, the Preacher considers all the oppressions that are practiced on earth. In the Law as well as the prophetic literature of the

Old Testament, the oppression of the poor by the rich and powerful is censured (for example, *Leviticus 19:13*, *Deuteronomy 24:14-15*; *Amos 5:10-13*; *Zechariah 7:10*), and the oppressive rich are warned of God's coming judgment. Here, however, the oppressed are observed as having no one to comfort them. "How can this be?" one might ask. If God is "the God of all comfort" (*II Corinthians 1:3*; cf. *Isaiah 51:3,12*; *Psalm 86:17*) and the Holy Spirit is promised as "another Comforter" (*St. John 14:16*), how is it that the oppressed have no comforter? What we must realize as we read and ployers. No person or group of people within the society he is observing is able to make a difference or provide real comfort and hope to those who are being treated cruelly and unfairly by their masters. study *Ecclesiastes* is that the Preacher makes observations that are general and then shares his thoughts and insights. When he observes that the oppressed have no comforter, he means generally that no human being is providing comfort or support to workers who are oppressed by powerful masters or em-

abolished, and trade unions have been established which negotiate with employers for better working conditions and pay for workers. Yet there are still companies and situations where oppression occurs, whether it be through low wages, extended hours of work, or favoring some employ-

Insights from the Preacher: Ecclesiastes 4

ees over others in assigning certain duties. There are places where farm workers are still not properly housed. There are countries in the world where children are exploited as laborers to harvest jasmine for the oil of expensive perfumes. Of course, child trafficking continues and is another way for some people to enrich themselves at the expense of the poor. Then there are those that promise to pay their workers and either withhold their pay or pay them less than



thev had promised. Though many great advances have been made in the workplace and in the just

treatment of workers, we have to admit that oppression and unfair treatment of workers still continues in the workplace. It has not been universally abolished. The Preacher does not suggest ways to end oppression by the powerful. He observes the situation: The power of the oppressor, the tears of the oppressed, and no comforter for the oppressed. Just these observations, if we reflect on them, hold very serious consequences. Just as bullies at school think they can go

on bullying some students without facing consequences, so in some workplaces are supervisors and employees who imagine they can go on treating other employees unjustly and never face any consequences since they are the ones in power. But the day might come when their victim's misery under such treatment becomes too much to bear, and he might choose to react violently. Most people don't. They just suffer in silence. Then there are those who observe the mistreatment of their fellow worker but do nothing, not wanting to get involved, and the victim still has no comforter from among those who should have given him encouragement and succor.

In view of this perpetual oppression, the Preacher somberly praises the dead more than the living but concludes that the person who has not yet been born is better off than either since he has not seen all this "evil work that is done under the sun" (Ecclesiastes 4:3c, KJV). The Preacher's perspective does not consider the doctrine of the resurrection nor the abode of the righteous souls in Paradise, for he thinks that the person not yet born is better off than both the living and the dead. The Preacher's idea here could represent the preexistence of souls before their birth, such souls not being able to observe any events on earth prior to

being born. His idea of the dead does not seem to include the idea of any purposeful existence in which the sorrows of earthly life have been forgotten.

In his next observation, the Preacher remarks that a man is envied of his neighbor for all toil, skill, and labor (verse 4). Here he takes aim at the competitive nature of work, which is "also vanity and vexation of spirit" (Ecclesiastes 4:4c, KJV). This is to say, the rat race is an exercise in futility. Does this mean a person should not strive for excellence in his work? Surely not, but when that exercise is measured against the success of others, it can become futile.

On the other hand, there is the fool who folds his hands together and is left with nothing to eat but himself since he refuses to work (verse 5). The Preacher has observed oppression in the world and competitiveness in work, but now he notes the result of idleness, which he does not recommend. There is a necessary balance in work and life that the Preacher expresses in this way:

> Better is a handful with quietness, than both the hands full with travail and vexation of spirit. *Ecclesiastes 4:6*, KJV

The handful represents income. Both hands full shows double the income, but this of course requires much more labor which brings its accompanying weariness and a troubled mind. Quietness implies peace and sufficient rest. It is better to have peace and rest with a moderate income than all the stress that comes with the additional work associated with a higher income level.

Next the Preacher considers the person who works for himself, having no family to support. This person's goal is simply to accumulate wealth. As much as he attains, he is never satisfied with the wealth that he has (*Ecclesiastes 4:8*).

In the fourth observation in this chapter, the Preacher emphasizes the value of fellowship and company. Even two are better than one, for they have a good reward for their work (*Ecclesiastes* 4:9). One can think here of God's blessings of marriage and friendship. Each is there for the other, and one can help the other up if he falls (Ecclesiastes 4:10). Again, thinking of marriage, we can see the benefit each can be to the other, providing warmth when they lie together (verse 11). The value of friendship can be seen from the Preacher's saying:

> And if one prevail against him,

two shall withstand him; and a three-fold cord is not quickly broken.

> *Ecclesiastes* 4:12, KJV

This saying refers to standing against attackers, and it stresses that two or three friends together can withstand a solitary assailant.

In summarizing these observations of the Preacher, I conclude from them that though oppression of the poor by the powerful persists as an inescapable reality of life, we should approach work realizing that the competitive spirit is ultimately futile. We must avoid the extremes of working too hard for the sake of getting ahead and not working at all, both of which are selfdestructive. Instead, we should balance life and work so that we have enough peace and quiet. In addition, we should have friends and family to support and strengthen us as we do our work and share the rewards of our labor. Finally, remember St. Paul's exhortation for Christians which reminds us that none of our work in the Lord is ever in vain:

> Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye stedfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that

your labour is not in vain in the Lord. *I Corinthians* 15:58, KJV

July 14th Vestry Meeting Summary

Treasurer's Report:

- Elodia Fernandez reported that the Net Operating Income for the period January to June was -\$8,386.57.
- The Investment Account had increased in value by almost \$29,000 since the end of last year thanks to very impressive stock market performance.
- The Schwab Account Summary showed that the cash portion of the Investment Account was \$5,607.74. When this increases to a high enough level, it will be reinvested.

Junior Warden's Report:

Clark Patteson provided an update on T-Mobile and their desire to remodel the steeple. They sent him an e-mail requesting him to authorize said remodeling. However, steeple modification requires Vestry approval and must be tied into the negotiation of a new lease agreement with them, which should include a signing bonus and payment of market-value rent.
