A Message from the Rector: Readiness for Worship and for Ministry

Be ready for worship. Be ready for ministry.

Let us begin by explaining what it means to be ready for worship. Worship is our whole offering of ourselves to God continually, as St. Paul wrote:

I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God.

Romans 12:1-2,

A living sacrifice continues to live on this earth, and this entails a life of devotion to God, holiness, and willing obedience to all His commands. This is our "reasonable service." The same phrase in Greek can be translated as "spiritual worship" or "reasonable worship". This worship, or service, flows logically from the Lord Jesus



Christ's offering of Himself on the cross for the redemption of mankind. It is, therefore, spiritual in that it shows the deepest love believers can offer to God in response to the wonderful, inexpressible love of the Lord Jesus Christ for the world.

The daily offering of ourselves to God as a living sacrifice also requires

that we must not be conformed to this world, but rather transformed, or changed completely, by the renewing of our mind, so that we may discern and surely find out and come to know the good, acceptable, and perfect will of God (*Romans 12:2*). How are our minds renewed? Certainly not by listening to the world news! Instead, our minds

are renewed by daily reading, studying, meditating on, and applying God's word, the Bible, to our lives, and by daily prayer, including listening to God in silent contemplation or meditation to hear what His Spirit may be calling or

directing us to do.

Since worship is what the Lord Jesus Christ calls us to do continually, we must always be ready for it. This should direct our attitude towards Sunday worship and our churchgoing habits. Since we are worshiping God daily, Sunday worship must be the priority for the day. If people regular-

ly arrive late for the Sunday service when they are not hampered by any disability, what does this imply to others about their view of the importance of Sunday worship? Does it not imply that for such people something else other than Sunday worship has become a priority? If we are continually offering ourselves to God as a living sacrifice, is it too much of a sacrifice even to come to church a little early and spend the time in prayer before the service? Our worship is

ample has the potential to influence our fellow worshippers to adopt the same lack of punctuality and may even arouse in newcomers questions about the sincerity of our faith.

What about being ready for ministry to others? Worship and ministry to others go hand in hand. If our worship of God is defective, so will be our ministry to others. God calls us to vigilance. The Lord Jesus Christ gave this command to His disciples:

and ready for the Lord's Second Coming, as the bridegroom's household servants had to stay awake and be ready when their master returned in the night and knocked at the door. For example, the newcomer who visits our church— is anyone ready to minister to him or offer help? Or, if ushers or Sunday school teachers are needed, is anyone ready to do this ministry? Long before His Second Coming, Christ may come in the guise of a visitor! Are we

ministry to God in the offering of ourselves to Him to do His will, to praise Him, to confess our sins to Him, to thank Him for all His blessings, to intercede for others, and to pray for ourselves. When we often neglect to arrive in time for our Sunday worship, it may indicate that we have insufficiently prepared ourselves for a corporate act of worship that glorifies God and edifies the congregation. It may also indicate that we are careless about the fact that our exLet your loins be girded about, and your lights burning; and ye yourselves like unto men that wait for their lord, when he will return from the wedding; that when he cometh and knocketh, they may open unto him immediately.

St. Luke 12:35-36, KJV

The call is to be spiritually awake, clothed, filled with the Holy Spirit ready to meet Him?

We must realize that through the ministry of any one of us, someone could come to eternal salvation, return to the way of Christ after years of wandering in trackless wastes of futility, or have a weak faith strengthened! If we are not ready for ministry, we might miss this opportunity!

Are you ready for worship, and are you ready for ministry?"

y intention for the "Great Commission Campaign" is to comment on simple, practical actions we can take to increase our fitness for evangelism that we might be taking for granted or overlooking. I hope to identify steps that are easy, but which will also allow for self-reflection to nurture and encourage a stronger bond with our Lord Jesus Christ. To recap and review, these are the steps we are taking in our Great Commission Campaign:

> Step One: PRAY. Step Two: COMMIT.

Step Three: ATTEND

CHURCH.

Step Four: PRIORI-TIZE GOD.

Step Five: SUBMIT.

Step Six: READ THE **BIBLE**

Step Seven: Love.

Step Eight: Express JOY AND ENTHUSIASM IN Your Faith

Considering this article, I noticed there has been a lot in the news lately about selfimprovement. All of us seem to be striving for better health. We're trying to eat better by not having fast food as much and avoiding buying overly processed food to keep in our freezers. We are even looking at labels more to see what is in our food. And this is only our diets! Think about all the things we do to get more restful sleep and work in more daily exercise. We are trying to take better care of our bodies, but what about our minds?

I was listening to a radio show in my car and the host said something that intrigued me very much. He said that worshiping God is good for our mental health. Wow! Mind blown! Who would have thought that? I

looked it up, and it is true: Worshipping God can actually lead to positive changes in our brains. Now, I don't want to get too scientific about this-

It is important to worship and meditate for our own well -being to rejuvenate ourselves by strengthening our relationship with the Lord through praising Him and thanking Him for all our blessings. We worship to celebrate God's presence and power in our lives. God is within each of us who believe, and each of us are

to be a reflection of Him.

dredge writes in his article A Vision for Evangelism "we need to be intentional in our worship". I really appreciate that statement. But what does it mean?

As I said before, worship God with meaning and passion. Be more intentional. Come to church ready to meet your Maker. Confess your sins with contrition and resolve to leave your sinful thoughts, words, and deeds in your past. Ask God to show you the lesson He has for you in the Scripture readings and

then put His lesson to work in your life. Pray and sing hymns with your full focus on what you are saying to and asking of God. Expect Him to hear and to answer you. Put your

whole self—body, mind, and spirit—into worship.

We can't be lackadaisical in our worship of God. He is our Creator, our Redeeming Savior, our Provider, our Protector. He loves us completely, and He keeps His promises to us without fail. We need to treat Him with awe, with respect, with trust, and we need to love Him and keep our promises to Him. We also need to worship God with purpose in good and bad times. Our circumstances may change, but God is

always great, always good, and always with us through it all. He is our hope and our great reward.

God wants us to worship Him, and we are better for it when we do. We are to worship Him because He is our Lord and Savior and because our worship demonstrates our love for Him. It is said by experts that people who are faithful and worship God are happier.






