A Message from the Rector: On Epiphany

The Festival of the Epiphany in the Church's history originated in Egypt in the second century, the date of January 6th being chosen to oppose the birthday celebration of the Egyptian deity Osiris on that day. The original focus of this Festival was on the Baptism of the Lord Jesus Christ, but by the fourth century in the Eastern Churches, the Nativity of Christ as well as His Baptism were the principal events celebrated in this Festival. The Lord's first miracle at Cana also came to be associated with this day. In adopting this Festival later in the fourth century, the Western Churches portrayed it as commemorating the visit of the Magi and emphasizing God's revelation of Christ to the Gentiles (adapted from page 107, Massey H. Shepherd, Jr.:

The Oxford American Prayer Book Commentary. New York: Oxford University Press, 1955).

Epiphany is the coming of God to man in and through the Lord Jesus Christ for the particular purpose of redeeming and saving mankind. It is necessary in our own day to emphasize the Epiphany as the revelation of Jesus Christ as both the Son of God and the

Son of Man. The Epiphany means nothing really if Jesus Christ was just a prophet or a good teacher of morals. The Epiphany reflects our belief that Jesus Christ was revealed as fully God and fully man. The implications of this doctrine for our faithful witness to the Lord Jesus Christ are profound. For example, the message and teachings of the Lord Jesus Christ carry the weight of oracles from God Himself, in contrast to the di-



verse ways in which He spoke to Israel through the prophets. This is also borne out by the Lord Jesus Christ's saying, "I am the Way, the Truth, and the Life: no man cometh unto the Father, but by Me" (*St. John 14:6*, KJV). Whereas in the polytheistic religion of the ancient Greeks, an epiphany was the appearance of the gods to help people on earth, for Christians the Epiphany is the advent of Christ, and can refer to His second advent as well as His first (*II*

Thessalonians 2:8; *I St. Timothy 6:14*; *II St. Timothy 1:10*; *II St. Timothy 4:1, 8*; *St. Titus 2:13*). This Epiphany has as its goal the salvation of the world through Christ. St. Paul linked the first coming of the Lord Jesus Christ to the second in his *Epistle to St. Titus*:

For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, teaching us that, deny-

ing ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world; looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ; who gave Himself for us, that He might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto Himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works.

St. Titus 2:11-14, KJV

In this passage, St. Paul links the appearing of the grace of God in Christ for all people to having “the blessed hope” of the appearing (epiphany) of “the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ” (*St.*

Titus 2:13).

From this passage it is evident that the Lord Jesus Christ’s first advent had the purposes of giving His life to redeem all people from all sin, purifying for Himself His own people, and training them to abstain from ungodli-

ness and worldly desires, instead living sober, righteous, and godly lives in this world. The purpose of this Epiphany was not to establish a means of salvation that depended on faith alone so that its recipients might persist stubbornly in sin under the illusion that Christ’s grace would save them in the end. Instead, though every believer receives salvation by putting his faith in the Lord Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sins (*Romans 3:23-24; 4:23-25*), he must faithfully continue in obedience to God’s laws and Christ’s commandments and teachings. As the faithful embody this discipline and training in their daily lives, so they are being made ready for the fulfillment of their blessed hope of

the resurrection and of the glorious appearing (epiphany) of the great God and Savior, Jesus Christ.

In another passage of this same *Epistle to St. Titus*, St. Paul gives us more insight into the effects of the first advent and epiphany of the Lord Jesus Christ. This passage, like that quoted above, is read at services on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day:

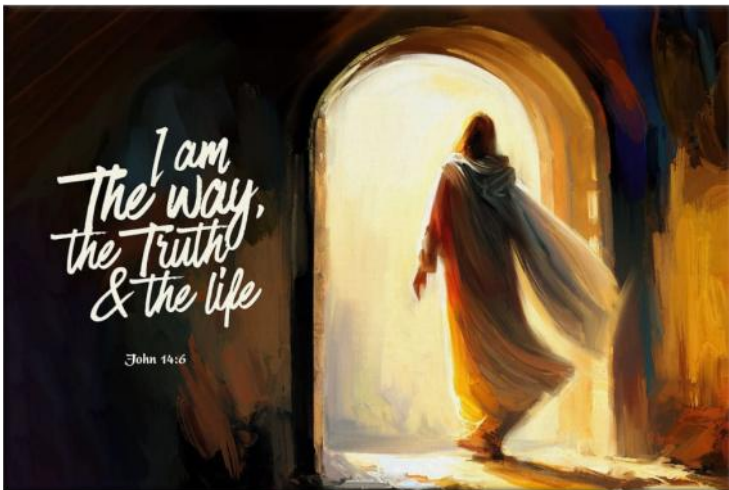
But after that the kindness and love of God our Saviour toward man appeared, not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saved us, by the washing of regeneration, and renewing of the Holy Ghost; which He shed on us abundantly through Jesus Christ our Saviour; that being justified by His grace, we should be made heirs according to the hope of eternal life.

St. Titus 3:4-7, KJV

The epiphany of the Lord Jesus Christ was a revelation of God our Savior’s love toward man. The washing of regeneration, or Holy Baptism, and the renewal through the Holy Spirit, received by Christians after repentance from sin and expression of faith in God the Holy Trinity, are gifts of God’s grace flowing from His great love and mercy to mankind. God poured out the Holy Spirit on us richly through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that, being accounted righteous by His grace, we might become heirs according to the hope of eternal life.

God’s epiphany of the Lord Jesus Christ has resulted in reconciliation with God through the death of Jesus on the cross, as well as the manifold gifts of grace that are the benefits of salvation, including the outpouring of the Holy Spirit.

The Holy Spirit, who is the Spirit of truth, leads the faithful in all the truth (*St. John 16:13*). Since the Lord Jesus Christ is the Way, the Truth, and the Life (*St. John 14:6*), the Holy Spirit leads God’s people in the fullness of the truth that is

Jesus and inspires their hope in His future appearing, or epiphany, at His second coming. Meeting the Lord Jesus Christ in spirit through the Holy Spirit entails coming to know the truth of who Jesus is and what power He can exercise in and through us to defeat sin and thus bring every one of us to complete deliverance from evil.

In his book *The Road Less Traveled*, the psychiatrist M. Scott Peck observed that people need to live their lives in total dedication to the truth rather than directing their minds using their own outdated and incomplete maps of reality. To achieve this total dedication to the truth, one needs to examine oneself continuously and stringently. I would add that one needs to do so, though, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit, who

leads us in all truth, including the full truth about ourselves. The Holy Spirit also reassures us of the love of God and comforts all who genuinely seek to draw near to God. The Holy Spirit will expose all false maps of reality in our lives, all sinful attitudes and habits of thought, and, as we yield ourselves to Him, will guide us in rectifying our thoughts, words, and deeds so that we learn to discern and do the perfect will of God in every area of our lives. All this happens day by day, as we listen more and more to the Holy Spirit and remain steadfast both in our faith in the Lord Jesus Christ for the forgiveness of sins and in our hope of His glorious appearing when He comes again.

Happy New Year and welcome to the latest edition of your Vestry Matters. I hope your Christmas season was happy and healthy and we look forward to seeing you at our services in 2026.

Summary of October 12, 2025, Vestry Meeting

Those in attendance: Jana Baldwin, Brandy Falcon, Elodia Fernandez (Zoom), Julia McNeely, Bridgitte Parrish, Father Chris Parrish, Clark Patteson, and Ben Taaffe.

Treasurer's Report (Elodia Fernandez)

- AT&T has now started making direct deposits for their cell tower payments
- Cash In:
 - * Income for Missions in September amounted to \$130, consisting of \$30 for Family Giving Tree, \$50 for American Red Cross, and \$50 for City Team Ministries.
 - * Total Cash In for September was \$2,741.88.
- Cash Out:
 - * The estimated Federal Tax installment of \$4,500 was paid in September. The State did not require payment at this time. The Federal Tax payment caused expenses to be higher than usual in September.
 - * Total Cash Out for September was \$9,229.09.
- Net Operating Income:
 - * The Net Operating Income for September was -\$6,487.21.
 - * The Net Operating Income this year so far was -\$3,744.00.



- Account Balance Record, Investment Account Graph, and Schwab Account Summary: Elodia reported that the Schwab Account Summary, end of day, Friday, October 10th, reflected a Total Accounts Value of \$342,014.03, less than the corresponding figure of \$349,079.81 at the end of September.

Junior Warden's Report (Clark Patteson)

- The roof gutters were cleaned and gutter guards installed in September.
- T-Mobile had come with five men to the Chapel on October 8th to inspect the church's building framing in the attic, in order to determine if the

structure would support a larger steeple. They plan to increase the number of antennas they have on our campus, which will require more space than is available. They will let us know in the next month or two about the feasibility of remodeling the steeple to a larger one.

- Brandy Falcon would like to plant some deer-resistant plants (rhododendrons) near the stairway from the office to McNeely Hall. This is in the unplanted area below the lawn and the fountain. Clark suggested that existing irrigation should be used to water these plants.

Altar Guild Report (Elodia Fernandez)

- Elodia reported that she would send out instructions for the holidays. Gluten-free wafers were being consecrated at every service of Holy Communion. Extra consecrated wafers were being kept in a pyx in the tabernacle. When the pyx was full, Father Parrish will let Elodia know so that additional gluten-free wa-

fers would not need to be put in the host box on the credence table

Rector's Report (Father Parrish)

- Deaconess Training: Father Alan Andreas and his wife, Sue, Directors of the Trinity Hall School of Ministry in Maine, were developing a program to train deaconesses in our Diocese. Bishop Fitzwater's letter and Father Andreas's outline of the preparation and ministry of a deaconess accompanied this report.
- Bishop Fitzwater has mandated background investigations for all Diocesan clergy. This is a requirement of the ACNA, and these checks will be done every five years. Our Parish was billed for the cost of these background checks for Father Parrish and Deacon Vogel, and our payment has been mailed to the Diocese.

Old Business

- Outreach:
 - * Julia McNeely will contact hotels on El Camino Real to put flyers in their lobbies.
 - * Julia and Brandy will discuss outreach to Foothill College.
 - * Brandy is willing to put up flyers on noticeboards.
 - * The Vestry is constantly looking for new ideas to help grow our church. If anybody reading this has any other ideas or would like to help in this very important mission, please contact Father Parrish or any Vestry member. Even better, join us at an upcoming meeting to offer your ideas and suggestions in person. The more help and input we can get, the better. Thank you in advance.



- Social media presence: Brandy reported that she had completed posts on the Great Commission and was using material from our newsletters on the church website to supplement her social media posts on Facebook and NextDoor.

New Business

- Farewell Gift for Father Penfield: After a brief discussion, the Vestry unanimously resolved to purchase a wine carafe with aerator and a bottle of Californian wine for Father Penfield's farewell gifts. The motion was proposed by Clark Patteson and seconded by Brandy Falcon. Clark said he would purchase the wine.
- Weed abatement: \$500 for weed abatement on the lower part of the Chapel property was approved.

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ave you ever thought about what it means to “ask, seek, knock”?

St. Luke 11:9-10

It is vitally important to ask persistently. Don't just ask once or twice but consistently and or without ceasing. Prayer is something that we as Christians do. It is as important as breathing. Petitionary prayer is our way of asking God for what we need.

Praying and doing it often keeps God center and primary in our lives. When our thoughts turn to worry, fear, discouragement, and anger, we are to consciously and quickly turn every thought into prayer and every prayer into thanksgiving. In his letter to the Philippians, St. Paul commands us to stop being distracted by worries and instead “be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication, with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God” (*Philippians 4:6*).

Petitionary prayer makes a request. God is very willing to answer our requests. There is not a specific prayer for making every specific request, but there is a process. It is important that the request should come from the heart and with sincerity. God listens and pays attention to everything. If you are persistent in your prayers, you are seeking God. Keep praying, because this invig-

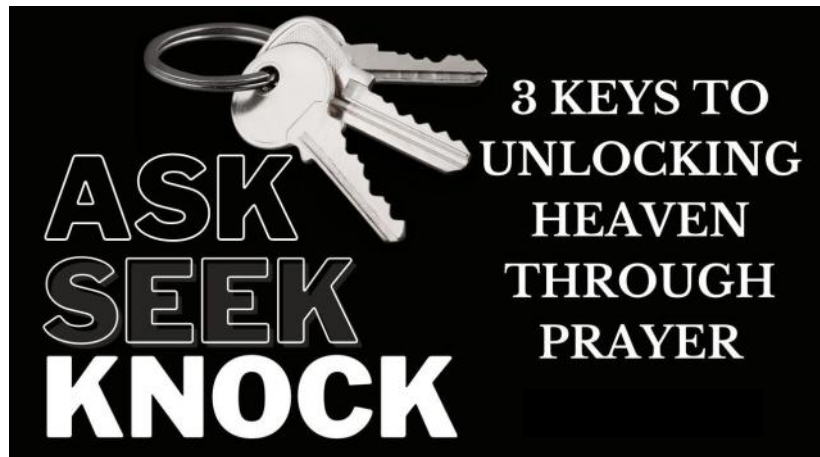
orates your relationship with the Lord. Even if you have doubts or questions about your faith, it is important to keep striving for truth. You will find it in Christ. When you find Christ, just knock, the door will be opened to you.

Ask: Be persistent in your prayers, knowing that God always hears you.

Seek: Continuously strive to learn all the truth in the Lord Jesus Christ.

Knock: Keep pursuing God, and He will open the door for you.

Parish Postings

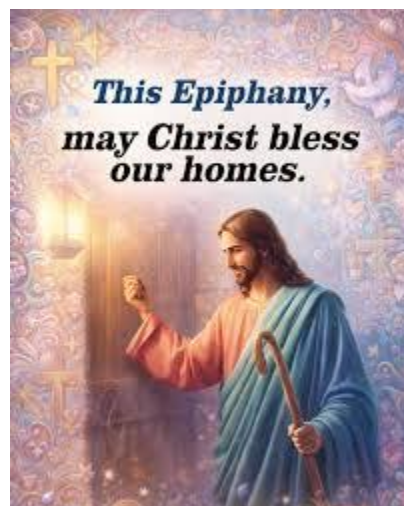
